1. INTRODUCTION

Buildings that are already Grade II listed are well protected in law. Many others in the village have been identified during development of the Neighbourhood Plan to have local importance because of their age, appearance, historic or cultural associations. They were suggested by parishioners and they are listed below as Non-Designated Heritage Assets or NDHAs.

Old barn on staddle stones by the road used to be village meeting place.	Country house in extensive grounds. Three-storey, brick built, with patterns typical of locality. NDHA5	Shiplake Row	Orwells	1700s	Formerly The White Hart pub, now award winning restaurant. Gateway position at entrance to parish.	Typical local C18 architecture, rendered brick, tiled roof, tall Georgian squared windows.
NDHA6	Shiplake Row	Rosemary Cottage	1600s	One of the earliest cottages in Shiplake Row, occupies gateway position at entrance to village.	Two-storey cottage with dormer windows in tiled roof. Rendered brick. Large grounds to rear.
NDHA7	Shiplake Row	Teapot Cottage	1700s	Cottage often used on old village postcards. Once home to Holmwood's head gardener. Setting for two grade II listed properties.	Half-timbered and rendered, decorative tiling at base of outside walls. Tiled roof and feature dormers; windows with Georgian squared panes.

NDHA12	Arch Hill	Woodside	1800s	One of several C19 detached villas built in the village, typically with long back garden.	Classic Victorian detached villa of this locality, but with tiled roof. Sash windows have tiled canopies.

NDHA21	Common Lane	Chestnut Cottages 1-4.	c1870	Row of four tiny cottages for farm labourers, three created from large barn belonging to Bournes Farmhouse in Harpsden Road, one added later.	Brick construction, squared windows, dormers and tiled roof. Some cottages have third storey in roof.

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NDHA22	Common Lane	Orchard Cottage	1700s?	Cottage and outbuildings backing on to the old Heath.	The house has a brown tiled, gabled roof, with dormers. The brickwork is predominantly red/brown, with a traditional oak porch and timber windows.
